

# UTILITIES AND COMMUNITY FACILITIES ELEMENT

---

## General Overview

---

People and communities need a whole host of community-type facilities and services. Some of these services are needed to provide basic levels of health and safety, while others help to maintain a high quality of life, foster job creation and create a sustainable economy.

Historically, the distinction between private-sector services and those provided by the public sector was quite clear. However, this distinction can be quite different from community to community and can shift within a community over time. With the trend of privatization, private-sector companies now offer some services historically provided by government. Likewise, some services typically thought of as private-sector ventures, are now in the realm of the public sector.

The provision of community-type services is a key element of this Plan and follows the general direction established by the Land-Use Element. As the population of a community grows, it may be necessary to build more facilities or consider providing new services.

## Objective of Element

---

The intent of this element is to provide basic information on the community-type services currently offered in the village of Twin Lakes and town of Randall with the exception of transportation related facilities, which are addressed in another separate element of this Plan (Exhibit F-1). The location, use, capacity and extent of services are identified for both public- and private-sector utilities and services.

All of this will help to identify what public services should be expanded or rehabilitated and what if any new services could be provided to address an unmet need.

### Exhibit F-1. Basic Objectives of the Utilities and Community Facilities Element.

- Identify and describe the full range of community-type services currently provided.
- Identify the capacity of these services.
- Identify unmet community wide needs.
- Identify what public facilities will need to be expanded in the future to accommodate additional residents and commercial and industrial uses.
- Develop goals and objectives that will accommodate the needs of current and future residents.

## Existing Facilities and Services

---

### Water Facilities

Neither the Village nor the Town has a municipal water system. Water is obtained for homes and businesses from individual wells, shared wells or neighborhood wells.

Several problems are associated with this system. One of these, as shared by residents who responded to the community survey, is the concern that individuals in many households are susceptible to contaminated water, which could result in health problems. The Lakewood

School occasionally must restrict the use of water fountains because of water quality problems. Another problem is both communities have high fire ratings (9 on a 10 point scale), which result in higher fire insurance policy rates.

### **Wastewater Facilities**

The Village has a sewer collection and treatment service available to its residents. The collection system is approximately 250,000 feet and operates with 11 lift stations. The plant utilizes an activated sludge process with effluent screening, ultraviolet light disinfection, phosphorus removal and aerobic digestion. The outfall liquid, approximately 650,000 gallons per day, flows into Bassett Creek and the Fox River. Given the fact that the sewerage is not monitored at the homes and businesses, it is very difficult to estimate the amount of clear water that is seeping into the sewer system. Regardless of the amount, it is removing groundwater from the Twin Lakes drainage area and placing it into the Fox River system. The Twin Lakes system cannot afford to lose groundwater because of its direct affect on the water quality of the Twin Lakes.

The town of Randall has an Urban Service Area surrounding Powers Lake and Benedict Lake, which legally permits the installation and operation of a municipal sewer system. However, to date no system has been developed.

### **Alternate Water and Wastewater Facilities**

With the location of the Town and Village on the glacial drift underlain with many feet of sedimentary sandstone and limestone, local residents and the municipalities, if they choose, have a number of options in searching for groundwater. With the Twin Lakes sewage treatment plant operating at only 50 percent of its capacity, the Village can expand the number of users on its systems. This expansion would benefit residents both within and outside of the Village.

### **Storm water Management Facilities**

Twin Lakes and Randall are rather unique given their location on many small drainage divides that have some internal drainage and soil capable of absorbing groundwater. Although this is currently not a major problem, the stormwater needs to be controlled at its source.

### **Electric Utility**

The residents of the village of Twin Lakes receive their electrical power exclusively from Alliant Energy, a privately owned electric power utility. Those living in the town of Randall are served by We Energies if their residence is in the eastern portion of the Town while Alliant Energy provides electrical service to the remainder of the residents of the town of Randall.

### **Solid Waste Disposal / Recycling**

The village of Twin Lakes currently contracts with Waste Management, Inc. located in Elkhorn, Wisconsin for the collection of their solid waste and recyclables. Under this contract, the cost of garbage and recyclables pickup is included in their local tax bills and in return the residents receive weekly curbside pickup.

The town of Randall also contracts for the pickup of their solid waste and recyclables. Their contract is with Onyx Waste Services, Inc. located in Waukegan, Illinois. The weekly pickup provides for unlimited household trash, 32 gallon cans or bags no heavier than 50 pounds, 1 household bulk item (furniture/carpet), yard waste material cut in lengths of 6 feet or less, bundled with string or twine in 32 gallon cans/bundles no heavier than 50 pounds each. Recycled materials include glass, steel food cans, plastics, cardboard, soft cover books/magazines, white and color paper, newspaper and aluminum cans.

The Kenosha County Hazardous Household Waste Recycling Program offers residents of the Town and Village opportunities for the recycling of their hazardous household waste. The program has been in operation since 1998 and has saved the Kenosha County taxpayers over \$315,000 in handling costs to date. On a scheduled basis, twice a year, residents can drop off

approved hazardous household waste at designated collection sites in the area. The collections occur on designated Saturdays from 8:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. This service is currently being provided under a contract with Waste Management, Inc.

### **Recreation Facilities**

The availability of parks, recreational facilities and open space are all factors that contribute to the quality of life in the community. It is important to recognize the value of these facilities in planning for the current and future uses of land in the village of Twin Lakes and town of Randall.

Currently the village of Twin Lakes owns and operates 7 parks and water recreation areas. Four of them offer a variety of playground and sports facilities and 4 of them provide water and beach access: 1 to Lake Mary and 3 to Lake Elizabeth (Table F-1). The village of Twin Lakes area is a popular destination for tourism and recreation. Consequently, the lake areas receive extensive use during the spring and summer months, offering a variety of boating and fishing activities. Water traffic is often quite congested and concern has been expressed by residents regarding the potential of over-utilization of these lakes by residents of other communities.

The town of Randall is situated in an area that also offers access to a number of lakes, parks and other recreational facilities (Table F-1). The majority of Powers Lake and Benedict Lake are located within the boundaries of the Town. Tombeau Lake connects to Benedict Lake from the town of Bloomfield across the town of Randall western boundary. Bassett Creek flows down from the Fox River through the New Munster Wildlife Area in the northeast corner of the Town.

During 2003 the town of Randall contracted with the firm of Ruckert/Mielke for the preparation of a Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan completed in April 2003. This plan is intended to be an important element in Randall's overall community planning efforts and offers an extensive inventory of all the facilities and lands which make up the town of Randall's park and open space system. It was prepared under the direction of the 7-member town of Randall Park Commission. The plan also was prepared in accordance with guidelines that make it certifiable by the Wisconsin DNR and qualify the Town for matching grant funds through the Federal Land and Water Conservation Fund and the State of Wisconsin Stewardship Fund. This is an important consideration for future projects and development of outdoor recreation opportunities in the town of Randall.

The village of Twin Lakes also has a Recreation Plan that was modified and adopted in 1997. This Plan is presently being reviewed and updated.

There are no designated state bike trails or bike routes in or near the village of Twin Lakes or the town of Randall. However, the White River State Trail is located nearby and goes between Elkhorn and the Walworth-Racine county line, just outside Burlington. It is a new 12.6-mile county operated trail that opened in June 2003. The trail accommodates a wide range of activities including biking, hiking, pleasure walking and snowmobile use. Local residents also have access to the Bong State Recreation Area near Burlington, which is a 4,515-acre multi-use recreation area offering 11 miles of off-road bicycle trails.

**Library Services**

The village of Twin Lakes and the town of Randall are served by the Community Library, one of two public libraries under contract with Kenosha County. The villages of Paddock Lake, Silver Lake, Twin Lakes support the Community Library and the towns of Randall and Salem as a municipal library funded by local taxes. A Board of Trustees that includes two members

appointed by each municipality and an eleventh member appointed by the area school district governs it. The Community Library began in 1977 and the Village and Town joined the district in 1993 with the opening of a facility in Twin Lakes. Facilities are also available in Salem and Silver Lake. All of these facilities are available to residents of the Town and Village. The library has more than 60,000 items, 8 full-time and 21 part-time employees and a large contingent of volunteers who are vital to its day-to-day operations.

The available services include access to the internet, a library search service, books, large print materials, reference materials, audio books, children's book-and-tape kits, compact disks, DVD's, videos, magazines, newspapers and tax forms. In addition, the Community Library has meeting rooms available at both locations for noncommercial use by local residents. Many specialized programs and book discussion groups are regularly scheduled and available.

### **Police Services**

The village of Twin Lakes Police Department is responsible for law enforcement, crime investigation, patrol, traffic supervision and community education. The current department staffing consists of 12 full-time staff, including the Chief, 3 sergeants, 1 investigator and 7 patrol officers. There are also 8 part-time staff that includes 6 water patrol officers who are seasonal employees who patrol the lakes in the Village. In addition, the Twin Lakes Police Department operates a dispatch center for immediate response to police, fire and rescue calls. There are 4 full-time and 4 part-time dispatchers staffing this operation. The department provides coverage 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and 365 days a year. In 2002 there were approximately 4,200 calls for police service.

The department equipment consists of 4 squad cars, one SUV, 2 17' boats, 1 personal watercraft, 2 police mountain bikes and 1 motorcycle. The department is located in a new public safety building located on Lance Drive in the Village. This building also houses the court clerk for the Municipal Court, 3 holding (detention) cells, and a local office of the Department of Corrections, Division of Probation and Parole. The Kenosha County 911 Center operated by the County Sheriff answers 911 emergency calls for police, ambulance and fire responses and often may direct them back to the Twin Lakes Police Department for handling.

The town of Randall law enforcement capability is directed exclusively to Water Patrol Enforcement. The staff includes seven officers, one of whom is the Chief. The enforcement officers are responsible for the patrol and enforcement of Powers Lake, Lake Benedict and Lake Tombeau. In addition, one inspector is responsible for the enforcement of all local ordinances within the Town. The Kenosha County Sheriff's Department provides all other police protection and services to the Town.

Both the Village and the Town operate Municipal Court Systems convening on a regular basis to dispose of municipal ordinance violations, citations and fines. In the Village the Municipal Judge is elected to a 2-year term and in the Town to a 4-year term.

### **Fire Protection**

The village of Twin Lakes Volunteer Fire Department is operated as a non stock corporation that owns the fire station and land that it occupies and the rescue equipment, receives an annual operating budget from the Village and provides services to the local residents. The Village owns the fire equipment. The staff includes 59 active volunteer firefighters including the Chief. The firefighters are called by pages received from the Kenosha County Sheriff's Department 911 Dispatch that are then re-toned by the village of Twin Lakes Dispatch Center. The equipment maintained by the department includes 1 pumper engine, 1 tanker truck, 1 brush/grass truck, 1 aerial ladder truck/pump, 1 equipment van, 1 crash truck and the Chief's/first response vehicle.

The department currently maintains an ISO fire rating of 9 in the Village. During 2002, the department responded to approximately 100 fire calls. The department also receives and

provides mutual aid to other fire departments in Kenosha County in conjunction with the mutual aid box alarm system (MABAS). The fire station is located at 236 East Main Street in the village of Twin Lakes.

The town of Randall Volunteer Fire Department owns the fire equipment and facilities to provide services to the local residents. The staff includes 42 active volunteer firefighters including the Chief. All calls for response originate from the Joint Services County-Wide Enhanced 911 Dispatch operated by the Kenosha County Sheriff's Department. The volunteers carry pagers and are available to respond on a 24-hour basis. The equipment owned by the Town includes 1 tanker truck, 2 pumper engines, 1 personnel carrier, 1 grass truck, 1 ladder truck (currently being replaced), and 2 dive rescue boats.

The department currently maintains an ISO fire rating of 9 in the Town. During 2002 there was an average of 125 responses to fire calls in the Town. The department also provides and receives mutual aid to other fire departments in Kenosha County in conjunction with the mutual aid box alarm system (MABAS).

The fire ratings in the Town and Village are high (9 on a 10 point scale). At the present time both the Town and the Village are examining initiatives and actions they can take that will serve to reduce their current ISO fire ratings.

The town of Randall currently has 2 fire stations. One is located at the intersection of CTH's P and Z and the other is adjacent to the Town Hall in Bassett. The Town has recently approved the construction of a new fire station to replace the one next to the Town Hall. Within the next year a facility will be built at the site of 54 acres owned by the Town at the intersection of CTH's KD and F. This new facility will provide for the relocation of the existing equipment from the current location in Bassett and the addition of a badly needed administrative wing.

Based on a recent fire facilities impact fee study conducted for the town of Randall, the Town has recently approved an ordinance that provides for the assessment of a one-time fee for any future residential or commercial/industrial construction to accommodate future demands for fire protection. The charges would be approximately \$1,034 for residential construction and .05 cents per square foot for commercial/industrial construction and are intended to offset operational costs in the fire department budget.

### **Emergency Medical Service**

The village of Twin Lakes Rescue Squad provides emergency medical service to the village of Twin Lakes and under an annual contractual agreement to the western portion of the town of Randall, as well as portions of the town of Wheatland. The eastern portion of the town of Randall receives EMS service under an annual contractual agreement with Silver Lake. The Twin Lakes EMS staff includes 30 volunteers, many of who are cross-trained to assist with calls for fire responses as well. The Kenosha County 911 Dispatch Center or the Twin Lakes Dispatch Center contact EMS volunteers by individual pagers to notify the scheduled volunteers of emergency calls. The Twin Lakes Volunteer Fire Department functioning as a non stock corporation retains ownership of the EMS equipment and has 2 fully equipped Basic Life Support (BLS) ambulances, 1 crash rig with extrication equipment (Jaws of Life), 1 mass casualty trailer, and 1 rescue boat. There are always sufficient volunteers available to respond to each request for service. In 2002 the village of Twin Lakes EMS responded to approximately 700 requests for service. The EMS is currently co-located with the fire department on Main Street in Twin Lakes.

### **Municipal Buildings**

The village of Twin Lakes owns a number of municipal buildings. These include the Village Hall on Main Street, the Police Department Facility on Lance Drive, the sewer plant on Gatewood Drive, the Public Works Building on Burlington Avenue, the Scout House and Concession Facility at Lance Park and 11 lift stations located throughout the Village.

The town of Randall owns 4 municipal buildings. These include the fire station at Powers Lake, the Town Hall and the fire station in Bassett, and a town storage facility in Bassett. In addition, the Town is also in the process of preparing the final plans for a new fire station to replace the one in Bassett. It will be located at the intersection of CTH's KD and F on a portion of a 54-acre parcel owned by the Town. It is expected to be complete by August 2004.

### **Electrical and Natural Gas Transmission**

The village of Twin Lakes residents receive their electrical service from Alliant Energy, which also serves a portion of the town of Randall. We Energies also serves the eastern portion of the town of Randall. The We Energies Company provides natural gas to the Village and the Town.

### **Telecommunications Facilities**

Verizon provides telephone service to Village residents and Charter Communications provides the cable TV service. In the Town, residents in the eastern portion receive their telephone service from Verizon and their cable service from Time Warner. Those residents in the western portion receive their telephone service from SBC and their cable service from Charter Communications. Cellular phone service is offered by a number of companies. Local Internet service is provided through the cable companies as well as a local internet/computer service business.

### **Health Care Facilities**

Although there are no hospitals or major medical facilities readily available in the village of Twin Lakes or the town of Randall, local residents do have access to a number of major medical hospitals in the area. Kenosha has 3 medical complexes, Kenosha Hospital and Medical Center, St. Catherine's Hospital, and Aurora Health Care Center. In addition there are a number of outpatient resources for surgery. Some local residents and emergency responses also use Centegra Hospital and Medical Center in nearby McHenry, Illinois.

The Aurora Medical Center in Kenosha is full-service community hospital offering a wide range of medical, surgical and diagnostic services as well as education and support groups to encourage overall patient well-being. Among the services it offers are a 24-hour emergency department, an urgent care/walk-in clinic, labor, delivery, recovery and postpartum rooms for new mothers, medical and surgical inpatient units, intensive care unit, inpatient and outpatient surgery, a pain management center, pharmacy services, an optical center and expanded community education center. The facility is set up and staffed for 43 beds. During 2001 the medical center had 3,781 patients for 12,375 inpatient days or an average stay of 3.3 days. The Aurora Health Center also operates a facility on Lance Drive in the village of Twin Lakes offering services in the areas of family practice, internal medicine, lab services and X-ray services.

The Kenosha Hospital and Medical Center is comprised of 4 facilities: the 156 bed hospital, Westosha Medical Center located in Silver Lake; Rehab Center West, located on the west side of the City and Kenosha Medical Center Clinic, located on the east side adjacent to the hospital. The hospital offers 24-hour emergency care, obstetrical and pediatric care, inpatient and outpatient surgery, pharmacy services, occupational and physical therapy and radiology services. The hospital is set up and staffed for 151 beds. During 2001 the hospital had 7,506 patients for 32,027 inpatient days for an average stay of 4.3 days.

The Children's Hospital of Wisconsin-Kenosha is located on the Kenosha Medical Center Campus. This "hospital within a hospital" opened its doors in 1999. Since then, more than 1,600 children have been treated at this acute pediatric hospital serving newborns and toddlers to school age youngsters. The facility is set up and staffed for 31 beds. During 2001 the hospital had 1,050 patients for 1,727 inpatient days or an average stay of 1.6 days.

In addition, Memorial Hospital Corporation of Burlington operates a 65-bed facility in the city of Burlington providing landing facilities for the Flight for Life Helicopter.

**Child Care Facilities**

With increasing numbers of families being headed by a single parent and as more women enter the workforce, the number of children needing day care is an important consideration for families and employers alike. Within the Village, there are 5 group childcare facilities with a total capacity of 230. Within the Town, there is 1 group childcare facility with a capacity of 20

(Table F-2). In addition, childcare centers in Wilmot, Silver Lake, Salem and other nearby communities may meet the needs of residents in the area. Childcare is generally at a premium.

**Cemeteries**

There is 1 cemetery located within the village of Twin Lakes and 2 cemeteries located within the town of Randall (Table F-3).

**Schools**

The students in the town of Randall and the village of Twin Lakes are served by 3 school districts. The Consolidated School District #1 of Randall serves the children of the Town and many areas of the Village. All educational and instructional activities are provided in a single school building, which serves students in grades K through the 8<sup>th</sup> grade. The facility is located on 87<sup>th</sup> Street in Bassett. The enrollment in May 2003 was 695 students and the District is anticipating a very slight increase in the upcoming academic year.

There are approximately 100 total teaching, support and administrative staff employed by the Consolidated School District #1 of Randall. Of this number 51 are teachers, 45 are support staff, and 4 are administrative staff. High school students in the Town attend Wilmot Union High School. There are no parochial schools in the Town.

The village of Twin Lakes School District #4 serves children from a portion of the Village. Students in grades K through 8 attend Lakewood School. The facilities are located at 1218 Wilmot in the Village. There were 407 students at Lakewood School in May 2003. There are currently 53 total teaching, support and administrative staff employed by the District. Of this number 32 are teachers, 19 are support staff, and 2 are administrative staff. High school students in the Village attend Wilmot Union High School. There is one parochial school, St. Alphonsus, in the town of Wheatland that serves students in grades K through 8.

The town of Randall and the village of Twin Lakes are located in the Cooperative Educational Services Agency (CESA) District #2. Funding for programs is determined through cooperative



sharing among member school districts and from categorical funding for special education grants obtained by CESA personnel from State, Federal and private endowments. The CESA district office is located in Milton.

## Community Facilities Plan

A number of questions were included in the 2003 Community Survey to gauge resident’s satisfaction with selected community services (see Appendix C). Of the services/facilities listed (Table F-4) over 77 percent of the respondents felt that fire protection, EMS and snow removal were good to excellent in the Village and 73 percent in the Town. Approximately 67 percent of the Village residents and 65 percent of the Town residents felt road maintenance was also good to excellent. Garbage collection was rated as excellent by almost 37 percent of the village of Twin Lakes respondents and 29 percent of the town of Randall respondents.

In the 2003 Community Survey local residents were also asked whether the Town and Village should further develop their park systems. In the town of Randall, 522 residents (56.4%) of those who responded said yes. In the village of Twin Lakes, 670 residents (59.8) of those who responded also said yes. The top ten items, in descending order of priority, that were identified for further development as part of the park and recreational services that are offered are identified in Table F-5.
